DEVEN'S STORY:

A participant's impact

Your support gives teens like Deven the chance to live by a new set of values. Values that help build resilience in the face of challenges. Values that have given Deven confidence in his power to make a difference.

Q: Can you tell me about your first trip with Outdoor Outreach, and what was it like doing something completely different from what your friends and family were doing?

A: "My first trip with Outdoor Outreach felt like a great opportunity. One that I rarely had growing up. My dad left when I was 2 years old. My mom did everything she could to support us but she was a single parent who was always working job to job, trying to make ends meet. We didn't have much family time or quality outdoor time growing up because my mom's focus was really just on survival."

"I've always had a love for the outdoors but we never really had the transportation to get to parks or public beaches. I was a real couch potato. When I went on my first stand up paddle boarding trip with OO as a participant at Mt. Miguel Highschool, I felt like I was walking on water. It was so much better than spending my time indoors."



Q: Can you tell me a little bit about where you grew up and the family system that raised you?

A: "Alcoholism runs in my family and I was around alcoholic family members a lot throughout my childhood. My father passed away when I was 13, and that's when I started drinking regularly. I thought it was normal to drink whenever, and to excess. Drinking really became my coping mechanism for grieving the loss of my father."

"Before [Outdoor Outreach], I never liked to express my feelings. I liked to bottle things up inside and not to show that there were things I was struggling with in my life. Even when I was a participant at Outdoor Outreach, I didn't really open up on that level. Alcohol was still my solution for dealing with my feelings."

Q: What is the biggest change you've seen in yourself throughout your time with Outdoor Outreach?

A: "Ultimately I've experienced so much growth through my work with Outdoor Outreach. I'm able to see potential in myself. It's helped me get back into school, and given me new motivation to grow so that I can succeed both here in my role at OO and out there in the world. I finally feel connected to something that I love to do and that I'm actually really passionate about."

"In 2018, Outdoor Outreach connected me to mentors who provided me with resources to help with substance abuse, and to find coping tools. When I finally opened up, it opened my eyes to what I'm capable of, and the potential in sharing that with the youth that we work with who have grown up in similar situations."

Q: Where do you hope to go from here? What are your goals for the future?

A: "I love sharing the connection that Outdoor Outreach has given me to the outdoors. I think when others see that anything is possible, they can see opportunities for their lives they may not have seen before. Getting pushed out of comfort zones and getting connected to new opportunities creates endless possibility for growth."

"If I can spread the positivity that I've found here to the youth that we serve, that's really important. Being a positive role model in a safe environment has a big impact on these youths' lives. Since I can relate to youth that are going through similar experiences that I had, I can really make that connection with them. I think I can really be a positive example."


